


# Conference 2023 - Celebrating the Elements - Whakanuia te Taiao SURVEY - CONDENSED RESULTS

### **Overall summary**

- 53 replies, all very positive! Speakers and workshops were outstanding.
- Event format was widely loved. The venue was loved, approval rating of 92% overall. Catering was great, 96% overall.
- Most people were from the Southland branch, next Auckland, then Wellington.
- 63% traveled on their own to the conference, 23% with celebrants, 13% with family/friends.
- Speakers did a great job of helping people feel connected, an average of 91% approval.
- Reasons for coming were varied, but in general having some connection to the creation of
  the event, proximity to the event, a wish to support, an interest in the programme, having
  interest in the location, and various financial helps were all key bits that helped people get
  across the line to attend.
- No one had any current issues with the AGM not being part of the event though some did reserve the right to make a full judgement until the AGM has happened.
- Overall, people felt the value for money was exceptional (85%).
- Nearly everyone felt we delivered on the theme. A few felt it was more about celebrating diversity than celebrating elements, though.
- 89% enjoyed the communications before the conference, with a few wishing there had been more, and few wishing maybe a little less.
- Suggestions to improve communications: A few wished to find their workshop choices more easily, and wished they could have switched them. Most people felt it was great. A couple presenters wished their presenter comms were more robust.
- 80% are looking forward to the conference recordings.
- 85% prefer workshops and plenaries, as opposed to only one or the other. Having plenaries can be good if they are widely appreciated by all. Having BDM as a plenary may not be great for those doing only funeral ceremonies (a couple said this).
- There was a high level of satisfaction with the plenary speakers and workshop presenters with many people commenting extremely positively on Dr Rev Wayne Te Kawa's and Sir Ian Taylors sessions.
- Discussion time was widely felt to be great.
- A cost of \$450 for a conference had 28% saying they may go, 8% saying they could not, and most people as dependent on where a conference was located, how profitable their year was, their interest in the event, and many other factors.
- Overall, 60% prefer conferences in major city hubs for easier travel but a lot of replies specifically said not to do Auckland.
- 45% are interested in a plenary only conference, but most people prefer workshops, citing workshops as a key part of getting to know fellow celebrants better and being more connected. But if it's significantly cheaper, it could work out.
- If there was a one-day conference, 62% would prefer some social events with it.



- Key topics that are wanted in future conferences are: more cultural learning, discussion on experiences, business elements, ritual, assisted dying, and social media
- GREAT WORK done by all!! Lots of gratitude in further comments.



- Yes. Amazing speakers and couldn't fault the food.
- Complex question when we all work in such a low-income profession - I know you couldn't do it cheaper.
- It is getting almost too expensive to attend, especially after airfares and accommodation are included.

## What topics would you like to see covered at future conferences?

#### Diverse range of speakers

- Really loved the variety of this year's plenary speakers, loved having speakers who weren't totally celebrant focused but life issue focused.
- I would definitely want to continue with a diverse range of plenary speakers. Doesn't
  always have to be on celebrant topics and I feel Sir Ian Taylor was a great example of
  that. Technology is always a great topic as it changes so rapidly. The panel was great on
  the Sunday and would be happy to see more of that in order to understand cultural
  differences and values.
- I enjoyed the varied mixed topics that were available.
- Assisted Dying
- Suicide more speakers along the lines of Sir Ian Taylor -
- More work on inclusivity, whether Rainbow or Cultural communities.
- BDM feedback. Legal aspects required to meet DIA legislation / Registry wedding info
- New happenings in the trade. Diversity in suppliers. CANZ FEEDBACK. Introducing all the CANZ exec if possible and the jobs they do + NE liaisons
- Hold debates on some of the contentious topics. It might be a way to hear the varied views of celebrants on those different topics. It could have some serious topics and other more light-hearted ones for balance.
- Jann Hook has suggestion on G.P she works with and Assisted End-of Life
- Ethics / AI /

#### Ceremony and ritual

- Public speaking, confidence, organisation and how to deal with challenging situations
- Something on less common ceremonies e.g., naming ceremonies, renewal of vows etc.
- A subset from within the array of course topics covered in a diploma course but covered in more depth. The 2023 sessions I attended did this well.
- Creative Writing



- Practical learning that can be included in our ceremonies and to enhance us as celebrants.
- Mix of ceremony types, diff enactments, workshopping...
- More stuff around ritual, seasons, elements.
- Self-care, collegial support (discussion around our table was new starters struggle with what to charge as 'business sensitive' area)
- Inspiring, spiritual, related to celebrancy, Advanced Care Planning workshop
- Ritual and ceremony around cremation; different cultures and their ceremonies and culture around those ceremonies (e.g., Chinese, Pasifika etc.).
- Challenging Scenarios as a Celebrant / Learning from each other experiences of being totally out there, off the cuff or caught out totally. Experiences and adaptation or coping experiences that we can all learn from.
- Maybe some case studies and firsthand experience from experienced celebrants Maybe 2 or 3 in a session, both weddings and funerals or 'other' (memorable ones) I think there is nothing better than listening to someone who has 'been there'.
   Business
- Small business accounting; the key topic I would encourage is a detailed session on all of the financial considerations that those members who run a celebrant business need to take into account when setting their ceremonial fees. In my view Celebrants undervalue the work they do by not reflecting the true cost of the work we do in our community which is reflected in the vast pricing differences that we see by Celebrants across the country. For me personally understanding our value that we bring to those in our care is critical in financial terms. In my experience The Celebrant School deliver an excellent detailed cost analysis session that is extremely helpful for Celebrants to reflect their value fiscally. I appreciate that this topic could be seen as conversational from the range of celebrants that do this work, nevertheless as CANZ strives to be more professional in the approach to our work I believe this topic has to be broached sooner than later.
- How to 'do', 'manage' 'attend' Zoom Meetings. Social Media how to create original posts on CANVA how to set up your Facebook Celebrant page
- Voice training. Accessing worthwhile and varied resources. Ideas for creating alternative ceremonies.
- Topics around building your celebrant business and how to market or present yourself / advertising. Topics around technology and how some technology can help us i.e. the use of microphones etc. / How to grow my business / Levels of Social Media support
- Perhaps have a stylist speak at one of the workshops covering clothing, colours and shapes suitable for celebrants.
- Performance critiquing would be great as we normally wouldn't see other people's work so don't have an idea of different styles.
   Cultural
- Māori culture, rituals and the right way of doing things.
- VCANZ/CPD process update or refresh.
- More Cultural Topics as NZ is definitely becoming a melting pot of different culture /
- I like the practical topics perhaps an embalmer explaining their processes. Perhaps



More cultural aspects (Maori and Pacifica) and tikanga.

## **Structure and overall impressions**

- Potentially no or less workshops and all plenary
- At the time of announcement, no need to give full programme, but would like to know start and end times to help when sorting travel.
- Shorter breaks on final day so people can get on the road a bit earlier.
- Love a little more time for breaks to connect with people.
- I thought that this conference had all the necessary elements. Time for whakawhanaungatanga, listening, thinking, laughing, and some hands-on activities. One thing I would suggest is that if we invite local mana whenua to welcome us let them do so first rather than keep them waiting.
- Perhaps having what region celebrants were from would have made it easier for me to help identify where they came from
- Please check the MC's values and style beforehand to ensure good fit
- Does it now need to be 2 days when the AGM is not included? Revert to the Education Forum style which minimises travel costs if at a main centre and fly-in/out is readily possible.
- Two roving people with microphones for delegate comments/questions
- Perhaps accessing sponsorship could be broadened out to across the country not just local. We may be able to get more money that way.
- Perhaps billeting at fellow celebrants' homes could lower the cost for some.
- Maybe an attendees pre- conference zoom so we can meet each other prior to the weekend.

#### **Catering**

- Catering was delicious and plentiful (perhaps too plentiful....?). I think money could be saved by offering no food at afternoon tea (just beverages).
- More variety in food; less food! / Some fresh fruit at morning and afternoon tea.
- In terms of food, the catering at the Museum was amazing, I knocked off 5 points for the Saturday dinner at the Lesiure Lodge. I feel the standard could have been better for that
- Less carb heavy food-it was delicious, but I feel most people like lighter options like protein with salads.
- Ensure water is supplied on the tables, important to hydrate.
- Catering was delicious but maybe a little too carb heavy. There seemed to be lots left over. I think we didn't really need such a big afternoon tea. To save money there could be fewer things.



#### Venue

- The venue got quite noisy at times. Not sure this could be rectified though.
- It would be ideal if the whole event was in the same venue, if possible
- The speakers should be principally focused on learning, although connection is a
  relevant outcome too for the overall conference. It's impossible to rate them all on one
  scale. I prefer not to be expected to pack 'glad rags' for the dinner, especially if not
  staying at the venue which entails more packing and more travel to and fro to get
  changed. I like ceremony to be demonstrated within sessions, as it was this year well
  done.
- Otago Museum was an excellent venue, my only complaint is that all my events were in the one room including the meal breaks which became a bit stifling, so I went out for breaks to get fresh air and peace and quiet.
- Only issue was the AC on and made the air dry.
- All conference rooms should be under one room. We were very lucky that it wasn't pouring with rain when crossing the quadrant to other rooms.

#### **Suggestions**

- I think the structure was good. I like that we can choose from a variety of speakers.
- Would like to suggest that maybe there are CANZ branded products to purchase, or order, at future conferences.
- More resources and product to buy from those in the trade. Books, ideas, etc
- I was disappointed I had to leave midday to get home in the winter given fog and wintery conditions, it is a tricky one, with so many attending with flights and by car in the winter to cater for everyone. Purely my own personal circumstances!
- Better seating arrangements for the evening meal. To get in and out for drinks and for the next course, was an inconvenience to people at the table. A larger venue would have been better for the dinner and entertainment.
- Lynne you and your team have set the bar high for future conferences...your kindness generosity your welcome and planning of every detail is to be aspired too.
- Table set out in the workshops especially in the conservatory was a bit restrictive.
- Name of workshop we were attending on our name tags rather than the coloured dot or a notice board to indicate which sessions were hosted where.
- Whilst the speaker for the Rainbow movement provided a well-researched presentation, this should have been offered as a workshop NOT as a conference general presentation.

#### Friday night meet and greet

- Friday night may have been a bit ambitious/in need of a little more planning.
- For those who aren't connected to others, a bit more of a mix and mingle would have helped on the Friday.
- Possibly a speaker on Friday night- like Sir Ian Taylor, or another motivational speaker, to set the scene.
- A good plenary on the Friday evening

- Collegiality and the chance to update professional development.




- To meet colleagues and new celebrants. As stated cannot beat face to face. Te tangata te tangata te tangata. The people the people the people.


#### **Responses:**

- In my extensive experience of other professional bodies incorporating an AGM into a conference, it was apparent that people would often fly out during the AGM or wag the session, especially if they thought there would still be a quorum.
- Yes, I do think it went well having the AGM separate. Was this when we had to pay to attend via zoom though? That would be my only negative feedback in terms of the AGM.
- Too early to tell. The original purpose of Conf was to get people to the AGM, so we've gone a complete circle! Where/when do members get to contribute democratically to decisions of structure, policies etc? Loved ending conf with Lynne's life membership a touch of class (even if technically it belongs in the AGM).
- I'm concerned that people won't attend in the numbers that usually come to conference.
- Unsure. Probably fine but I will wait to see how it goes via Zoom



This year conference was run on a very tight budget with an early bird price of \$350.00 for members (excluding travel and accommodation). This was achievable due to the HUGE amount of koha gifted to us. Due to a shortfall in numbers this conference has been subsidized for a number of reasons – impact of Covid and the recession. In general, it is the expectation that conferences are run on a cost-neutral basis. It is likely that a Friday night to Sunday afternoon conference will cost a minimum of \$450.00 (excluding travel and accommodation). We are exploring different options for the future. Please answer the following questions to help guide our planning. Will you attend a conference next year knowing it may cost around \$450.00 for a conference with the current structure of Fri evening (informal meet and greet) to closing mid-Sunday afternoon?

- Depends how many weddings and funerals I do, and where it is cost is a major factor.
- It will depend on where it's being held and how far I need to travel as flights and accommodation can add significantly to the overall cost.
- Possibly, especially if it is closer to Auckland / Possibly it will depend where it is
- If the timing works with other commitments then Yes, conference is a highlight.
- Wouldn't be financially achievable with transporting accommodation as well.
- Depends on other costs such as travel and accommodation which all put the price up.
- Yes, I would, however, I wonder if the Friday night is necessary?? Could you have
  delegates arrive on Sat morning and finish Sun afternoon? This way they registration
  could be less, and their cost for accommodation is reduced. Otherwise, I would suggest
  it starts midday on the Friday to allow for more sessions and adds more value to the day
  and registration cost.
- I would like to but I would have to assess other PD costs over the year.
- Am not sure due to personal reasons. I do respect the need for a cost increase.
- It really depends on how my year progresses and where the conference is held
- It would completely depend on the cost of travel and accommodation on top of the conference cost. Friday evening meet and greet, while a great way to meet up and start connections, is also additional costs (drinks, dinner, taxi).


- Lots of yes's to this (20) / 100% / Absolutely / Definitely / I believe so

- The theme had a nice ring to it. Overall, it seemed to be more about Diversity. As an aside, Matariki provided a missed opportunity to link to the theme of "Celebrating the Elements" and demo out-of-the-ordinary ceremonial enactments, and connect participants would have been a great opening plenary with each half day opening with an invocation or similar reflecting an element (but don't let this refinement detract from what was a great occasion regardless)
- Loved the connection running through the conference
- I did find myself wondering how the theme related to some of the plenaries and workshops...so, No, not really. The Matariki workshop was clearly related- perhaps we could have explored other elements?


- From an attendee point of view the comms were great, from a plenary speaker/presenter point of view this could be improved.
- I couldn't work out how to find where my choices for sessions were. An app to download with all relevant information on it would have been useful. Or did I just not realise there was one?
- Actual week of there could have been perhaps a better way to confirm the workshops booked/successful to attend and what to bring and a list of attendees (even if that was just CANZ members registered)
- Emails to delegates out about 2 weeks prior, with their chosen sessions listed many couldn't remember their choices and then wanted to change.



- For workshop presenters an indication of group numbers and attendee names.
- Maybe ask for members to give some suggestions on the topics/speakers they would like to see during the lead up of organising.
- If Covid tests are a pre-conference requirement explain what the expectation on the day is, to acknowledge a negative test.
- Can I suggest a list of delegates (approval obtained) is made available post conference.
- Some people didn't receive the comms so sending them from a known email address would reduce the risk of them being classified as spam.
- I think you did well. In that last week in particular with reminders and any things to know before you go was great.
- I had no pre-conference communication difficulties.
- Only thing is we could possibly have had accommodation options a little earlier.
- Keep all communication simple, easy to read and just enough.
- Perhaps some videos of venue, workshop leaders etc.

How are our communications post conference?



#### Suggestion




- I think the less central venues are more inclusive too, maybe a balance alternate years

- I think it is important for all Branches to be given the opportunity to host conferences
- I'm easy providing the city is accessible I think if it was in Auckland or Wellington it would cost even more.
- Tauranga or Rotorua could be considered too


- The content would need to be carefully curated.

  competing conference a month earlier, sponsored by TCTS would likely have diluted the

  alternate years and a number of regional, possibly simultaneous conferences? Mind
  you, conversing in person with other celebrants was most valuable, given that my
  training was all on line.

- Fab, fab, fab and huge ups to the Dunedin conference committee.




- The conference was wonderfully run, thank you to the volunteers! Suggestion for future give each delegate a runsheet incl. their workshops and where they are, alongside a map.

- Congratulations to the Southern Branch. It was a monumental undertaking. It was excellent.




Which branch are you member of? (Celebrants Aotearoa members only need to answer)








(Shown as average score, individual scores ranged from 70 on the low side to 100%)
